A quick reminder of what we can do to prevent COVID-19

Samoan Language Week

This year's theme for Vaiaso o le Gagana Samoa - Samoa Language Week is Fa'aāuāu le Folauga i le Va'a o Tautai - *Continue the Voyage with Competent Wayfinders of the Ocean*. As part of this year's overarching theme of 'Sustainability', the Samoan community chose a theme that would reflect the journey of language revitalisation and maintenance as well as recognising the importance of having the right tools, good leadership skills, relationships and the correct medium (va'a) that is adaptable to faring the ocean and its elements. This year signifies the 60th anniversary of Samoa's independence and the 12 years that Samoan Language Week has been celebrated in New Zealand.

The Samoan student leaders have been busy in school putting together plans for next week's Samoan Language week celebrations. We will be holding an inter-whānau Lape competition during lunchtime on Monday, Art workshops on Tuesday, games and challenges on Wednesday and student performances on Thursday. We will focus on simple words and phrases in Samoan and a quiz in Hui Ako time.

The meeting is a chance for our Pasifika families to come together to discuss how we can all best support students to be successful at school, to share information and ideas and connect with other families. Aotea College is excited to be welcoming International Students back! With the return of International Students, we are now looking to expand our pool of homestay families, for both short term and long-term hosting.

Why host?

Hosting a student is an enriching experience for both yourselves and the student. You'll experience a true cultural exchange, sharing knowledge of your culture whilst learning about the many different cultures represented by our students. Often host families build lasting relationships with their students

What is expected from host families?

Involve their student in their life, spend time talking with their students to give them confidence speaking in English and treat them as a member of the family.

Be caring and understanding, patient but able to set boundaries

Show their students how to get to and from school (e.g., where the bus stop is, how to access the bus schedule, how to walk to school).

Provide three meals a day and snacks (including a packed lunch during the school week).

Provide a furnished bedroom

Provide bed linen (sheets, pillow, and blankets) and towels

Aotea College has a well-resourced International Department, with a Homestay Co-ordinator who is able to provide you with advice and support.

Homestay families are paid a weekly fee which is reviewed annually.

Year 9 Out of zone enrolments 2023

Aotea College enrolments are controlled by an enrolment scheme which helps us to manage the growth of the school. This means that students who live in our zone are guaranteed acceptance if they choose to enrol with us.

All out of zone enrolment applications for <u>Year 9 2023</u> students <u>must</u> be received at Aotea College by <u>Monday 25th July 2022</u> to be included in the ballot.

A ballot will be held on Monday 1st August 2022. All applicants will be notified by Thursday 4th August 2022.

Please note that if your out of zone application is received after the closing date, it cannot be included in the ballot. Your application would then be added to the waiting list.

Community Notices

The Reverend Sylvia Jenkin was my beloved aunt, and she died a week ago in Longview Home, Tawa. Before she passed, we talked about what she wanted to happen after her death. She wanted a quick cremation and then after a couple of weeks, a memorial service at Tawa Union Church. She hoped this would be enough time for the news of her death and information about the service to reach any of the people she had worked with when she was a Minister in Porirua in the 1970s, and also when she lived there again in the 1990s and 2000s.

Sylvia especially wanted to make sure that any of her Pasifika friends who wanted to come to the service would know about it in time. Sylvia's memorial service will be on Saturday week, 4 June, at 2 pm in the Tawa Union Church.

From 1973 to 1980, Sylvia worked as the Community Minister of St Martin's Church, Porirua, where she helped establish the Opportunity Centre ("Our Place"), which included a place for young people to gather in the evenings as well as an "op shop" which helped to support it.

The centre opened in 1978 as a recreational and activity centre for youth and families with eighty volunteers, a full-time youth worker, two part time staff, and Sylvia as co-ordinator. ... those young people ... remember Our Place with its adult members always ready to chat with them and help sort problems while playing pool or at the disco.

In 1992, Sylvia moved to her own house in in Cannons Creek, Porirua, and then worked part time as transition minister for St Columba, Naenae, until 1995, when she retired. Sylvia's retirement enabled her to do more voluntary work, for example, with the Porirua CAB, but her greatest contribution was in conservation. From the beginning, Sylvia took a leadership role in the Cannons Creek group (now called Friends of Maraa Roa), which has, over twenty years, restored the bush around Cannons Creek. In 2002 Sylvia received a Civic Award for her work in and around Porirua (especially in initiating and developing the Maara Roa project), and in 2006 she won the "Wellingtonian of the Year" award for community service. At the end of 2014, Sylvia sold her house and moved to a flat in Summerset Retirement Village in Porirua City.
