First lines of books are also on display with a library version of "uber reads" and books in paper bags to takeaway. Sold only with the first line of the book rather then being judged by the title and cover.




NON FICTION


Nonfiction books have come along way over the years. More engaging and well laid out, they bring facts to life and teach young people about the world around them. Even with all the information on the internet, nonfiction books are an important part of the library to support curriculum and student's interests.


Author Melissa Stewart divides nonfiction into five distinct types: **Traditional**, lots of information about one single topic; **Browsable**, readers pick up, pursue, set down, and return to; **Narrative**, similar to fiction, condenses information of a moment in time or story to convey only the essentials that keep the story moving; **Expository**, dives into a single topic with curiosity and enthusiasm; & **Active nonfiction** invites readers to do, make, or engage with the text.



Apply for the Ministry of Education's Tulī Takes Flight Scholarships for 2023 – opens 17th October & closes 15th November 2022

The Tulī Takes Flight (Tulī) Scholarship is part of the gesture of goodwill and reconciliation to Aotearoa Pacific families and communities that followed the Government's 2021 apology for the Dawn Raids that occurred in the 1970s. The scholarship is intended to support Pacific people to reach their potential by reducing some of the financial barriers towards tertiary study or training. There are scholarships for both vocational and degree level study and training in Aotearoa. The Tulī scholarship can also support people changing careers or taking up opportunities in fields of tertiary study or training that have limited Pacific presence.
